Can You Be INSPIRED?

When the name of Barry Goldwater was put in nomination at the Republican convention, a mass demonstration followed. Thousands waved banners and posters, screamed and cheered and whistled hysterically. All this was accompanied by a marching band. A flurry of ticker tape belched into the air. The wild frenzy continued for some time under the throbbing beat of the band's bass drum.

At Atlantic City during the Democratic convention, Bobby Kennedy was introduced to the convention as "the man closest to his brother, Mr. John F. Kennedy." At that moment the crowd erupted in applause, whistles, screams and cheers. This ovation of approval lasted *twelve minutes*!

These crowds certainly seemed inspired. But, by what? Inspired by selfish interests! Inspired by lust for personal gain! Inspired by partisan views!

God's people meet every Sabbath—not to "nominate a candidate" or to wave banners and posters, or to scream, cheer and whistle hysterically— but, TO WORSHIP GOD! Can WE BE INSPIRED? Rightly inspired? Not by selfish interests, lust for personal gain or partisan views, but by God's Spirit! Not inspired to wild demonstrations of frenzy, but to an emission of sincere love and praise to God the Father and our Lord Jesus Christ!

Will God's people show the same enthusiasm and zeal in "cheering" for God through praises in the song service? Can we SING with deeply felt emotion of PRAISE and GRATITUDE toward the greatest of all—GOD ALMIGHTY!

It seems that at regular intervals God's people have to be admonished TO SING. It's commanded of you! It's a sin not to sing praises to God. Still, the real gusto is not always there.

Why is it that people can be so enthusiastic for conventions, sports events, riots in the streets and public mass demonstrations for civil rights? But take *some* of those same people—which some of us were—put them in God's Church, ask them to sing praises to the God of heaven, and what happens? What happened to you?

Brethren, is it true that in us resides so much of the *carnal mind* that we show this HOSTILITY—hate—toward God through not singing praises to His name!

Each Sabbath let's show the world that we have much more zeal for Jesus Christ than they do for their worldly nominees. Let's follow Paul's admonition: "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in (through or by means of) psalms and *HYMNS* and *SPIRITUAL* SONGS, *SINGING* with grace in your hearts to the Lord" (Col. 3:16). Yes, teach and admonish others through your example of zeal and enthusiasm in the song services of God's True Church!

Presenting the Big Sandy Ambassador College Faculty

Ambassador College is one of the nation's newest colleges—actually less than two months old—yet the semester opened with a fully competent and veteran faculty. Classes began with 109 students enrolled and a faculty that numbers 14, plus five part-time college instructors who also teach in Imperial School. This ratio presents a top-level student-teacher rating.

By means of this article we want to acquaint you briefly with the Ambassador College Faculty. Space would not permit an interview with the entire faculty, but their names, positions, and subjects taught have been included.

Mr. Leroy Neff, Deputy Chancellor



A little more than a year ago, Mr. Neff and his family were transferred to Big Sandy. Leaving his home in Oregon, Mr. Neff attended Ambassador College from 1955 to 1959. He received his Masters Degree from Ambassador College in 1962.

While in Pasadena Mr. Neff was in charge of the Mail Receiving and Special Services Departments. After graduating, he taught public speaking in Ambassador College and pastored the Long Beach Church for two and one-half years.

In addition to the pressing responsibilities of Deputy Chancellor, Mr. Neff is also Business Manager of God's work in this area, pastor of the Big Sandy Church, and District Superintendent. Moreover, Mr. Neff teaches world history, speech, Old Testament survey, and principles of living in Ambassador College. Dr. Charles Dorothy, Dean of Instruc-



Dr. Dorothy came to Ambassador in 1955, as a college graduate from the University of Washington. With a degree in political science and a lieutenant's commission, his ambitions pointed toward a career in the air force. The next few years brought changes beyond expectation.

After graduation from Ambassador in 1958, Dr. Dorothy's first assignment was to pastor the Salem and Eugene, Oregon, Churches. After six months another change brought him back to Pasadena where he was vitally needed to teach several classes in the college. After four summers of hard work at the Inter-American University at Saltillo, Mexico, he acquired a doctorate in Spanish.

Presently, Dr. Dorothy is Dean of Instruction at Ambassador College, Big Sandy, and teaches Spanish, international relations, two Bible classes and classical literature. He also is pastor of the Houston Church. He and his wife now have three children and the fourth on the way.

Mr. Ronald Kelly, Dean of Students



After graduating from Ambassador College in 1960, Mr. Kelly was sent to pastor the Sacramento and Fresno Churches in northern California. Later he was recalled to Pasadena where he served as an executive assistant to Mr. Ted Armstrong and also taught several classes in the college. Another major change brought Mr. Kelly here to Big Sandy as Dean of Students. He teaches two Bible classes, three German classes, and two speech classes. Mr. Kelly, now a family man with two children, pastors the Dallas and Fort Worth Churches.

Mr. L. E. Torrance, Registrar



If we would look back ten years, we would find Mr. Torrance as a pioneer instructor in the Imperial School at Big Sandy. After one year at Big Sandy, he was transferred to Pasadena where he continued teaching in the newly established Imperial School. For the past six years Mr. Torrance has been a fullfledged faculty member of Ambassador College in Pasadena.

Graduating from Colorado State University and Colorado State University of Education, both Mr. and Mrs. Torrance taught several years in public schools. They now have three children. Besides his duties as Registrar, Mr. Torrance teaches English, typing, and etymology.
